Pursuant to Village of Oak Park Resolution 20-120 dated March 13, 2020, the Oak Park Village Board has declared an emergency affecting the public health due to the outbreak of the COVID-19 disease pursuant to Section 8-10-5 of the Illinois Municipal Code, 65 ILCS 5/8-10-5, and Sections 2-6-10, 2-27-9 and 20-1-6(Z) of the Village Code. Pursuant to the Resolution, the Village's Public Health Director has the authority to make "reasonable rules, regulations and orders . . . as may from time to time be deemed necessary for the preservation and improvement of the public health and for the suppression of disease."

BULLETIN

The risk of COVID-19 disease for the majority of the US population, including Oak Park, remains low and it is our belief that with some basic precautions during community gatherings of limited participation, we can help maintain that low risk status. That said, the spread of COVID-19 is a rapidly evolving situation and the intent of this BULLETIN is to share with the public basic public health information that does not require the issuance of an emergency notification through the Village's alert system that is used to notify residents when emergency situations occur, not general information. THERE ARE NO PRESUMPTIVE POSITIVE TESTS IN OAK PARK

The Village of Oak Park Department of Public Health has not received any notification of presumptive positive tests for Oak Park residents or individuals in medical care in the Village.

The Village has authorized six (6) COVID-19 test for Oak Park residents. There have been three (3) negative tests and three (3) tests are still "pending" results.

Privacy precludes location information to anyone other than Public Health Officials and First Responders.

It is a crime to knowingly spread any false information or report that a person has contracted COVID-19 disease on any social media or other public platform under the Illinois Department of Public Health Act or to make a false report regarding the contraction or spread of COVID-19 to any public official under the Illinois Criminal Code.
